Project Information

-) This June 15, 2001 report is the third quarterly report for Fiscal Year 2001.
-) Dispositional information is included in this report every six months (in the 2nd Quarter Update and The Final Report).
-) This report was made possible with funding assistance from the Governor's Children and Youth Coordinating Council (CYCC) and the Office of Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention (OJJDP).
-) Purpose: collect, analyze, and disseminate accurate information concerning juveniles processed through the adult criminal justice system.
-) Senate Bill (SB440), codified in O.C.G.A. Sec. 15-11-28 (b) (2) (A), gives the superior court exclusive jurisdiction over children ages 13-17 who are alleged to have committed one of the following offenses (commonly referred to as the "Seven Deadly Sins"):
 - Murder
 - Voluntary Manslaughter
 - Rape
 - Aggravated Sodomy
 - Aggravated Child Molestation
 - Aggravated Sexual Battery
 - Armed Robbery if committed with a firearm.
-) Transfer to Juvenile Court: Prior to indictment, the district attorney may elect to send the case to juvenile court. If the case is transferred to juvenile court it is subject to the provisions of O.C.G.A. Sec. 15-11-37, the Designated Felony Act. After indictment, a case not involving an offense punishable by death or life imprisonment (voluntary manslaughter, aggravated sexual battery, and a first offense of aggravated child molestation), may be transferred to the juvenile court by the superior court after "investigation and for extraordinary cause."

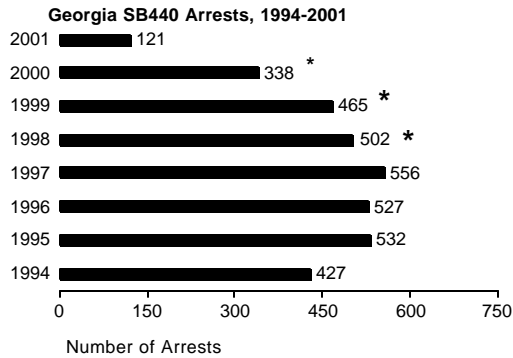
Current Report Data

-) This report includes information from May 1, 1994 through March 31, 2001.
-) Between May 1, 1994 and March 31, 2001 approximately 3,500 juveniles have been arrested for an SB440 offense. This number reflects arrest information provided to GIDC by a variety of sources such as the Department of Juvenile Justice and public defenders. ***Please note that the total number of arrests for the years 1998 to 2000 are incomplete; the Department of Juvenile Justice has been unable to obtain arrest information from at least one correctional facility. If/when this information becomes available, it will be added to our database, and a note will be included in the following report.***

The numbers above reflect the numbers of juveniles for whom complete arrest information is available.

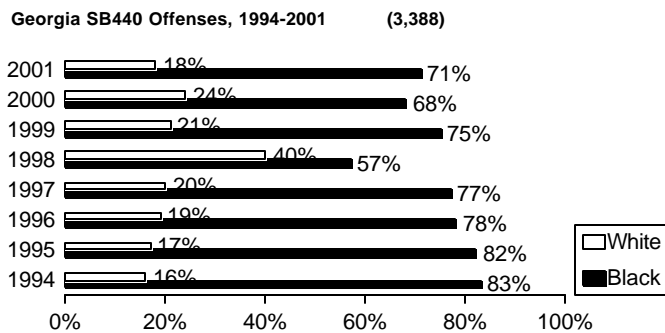

Between May 1, 1994 and March 31, 2001 approximately 3,500 juveniles have been arrested for a SB440 offense.

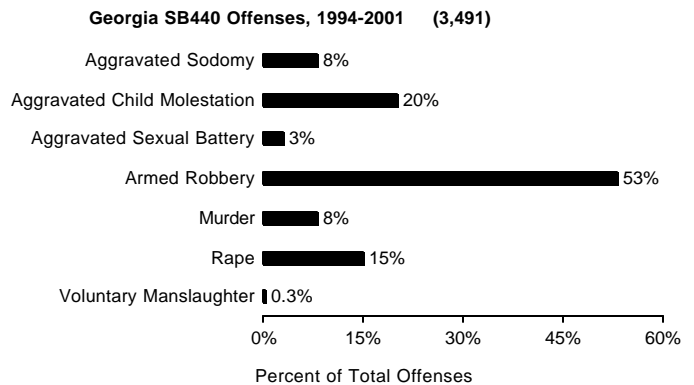

Arrest Trends by Offense, 1994- 2001



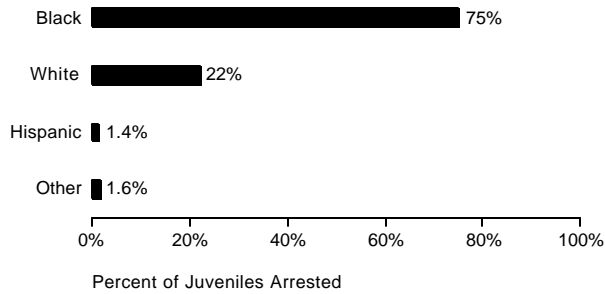

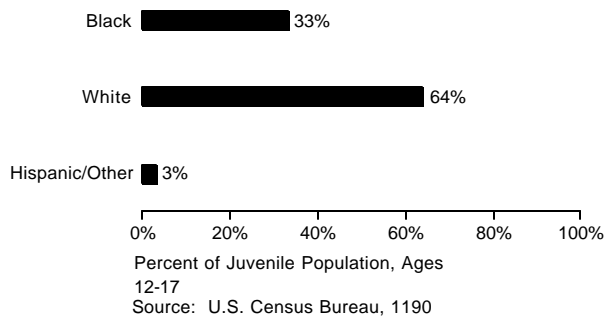

Race Profile, 1994- 2001 (3,426 juveniles)

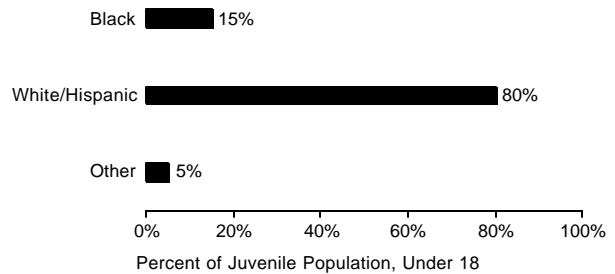

Racial Composition, U.S. Juveniles (Under 18)

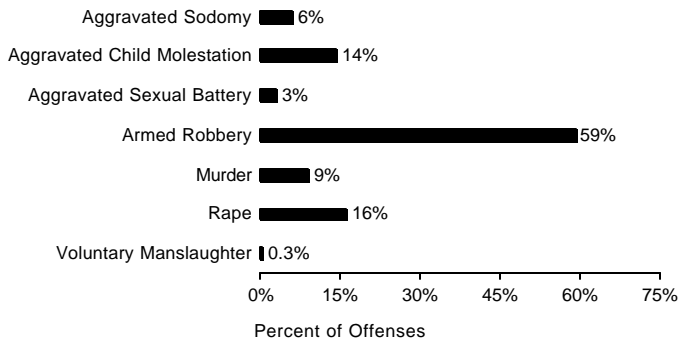

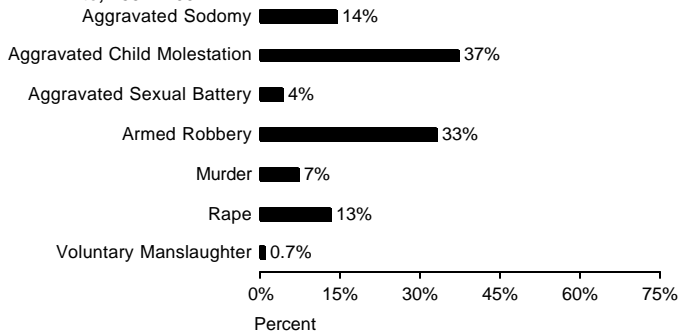

Race by Offense

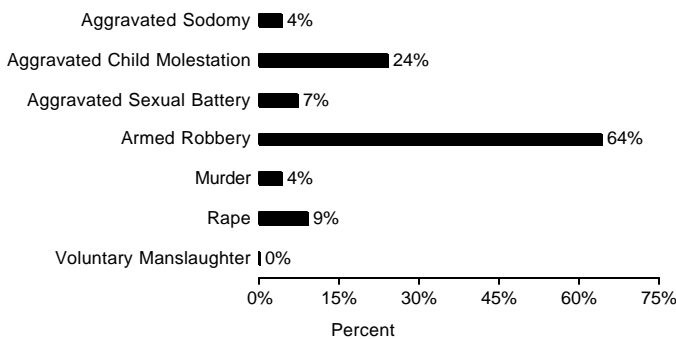
Black, 1994-2001 (2,540)



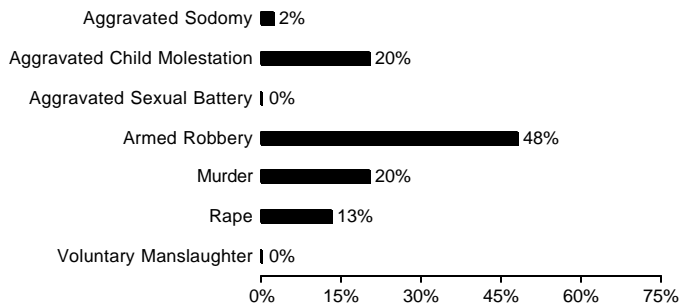
White, 1994- 2001 (763)



Hispanic, 1994- 2001 (45)



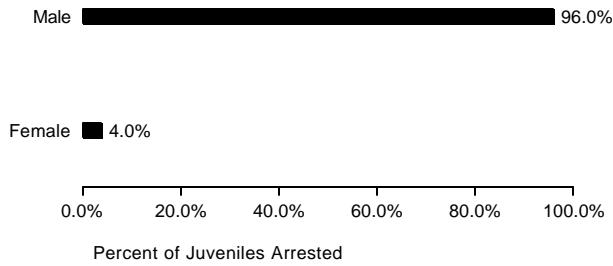

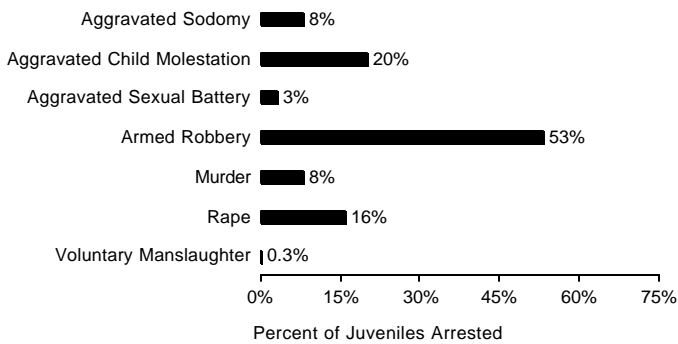

Gender Profile, 1994- 2001 (3,493 juveniles)

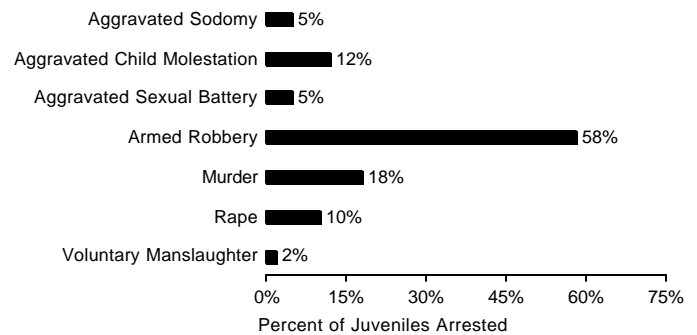


Gender by Offense, 1994- 2001

Females, 1994-2001 (134)



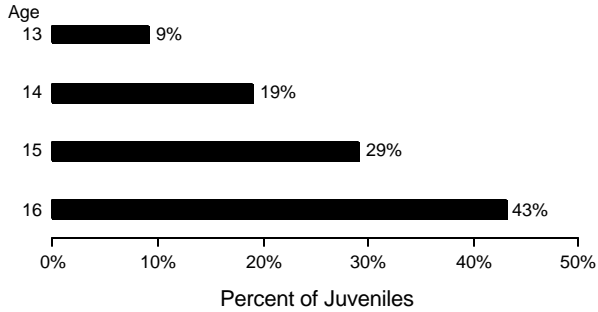

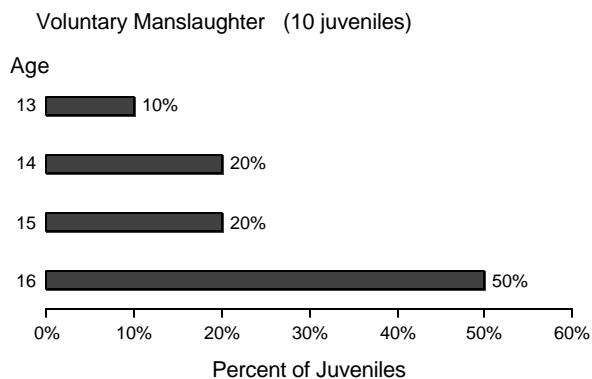
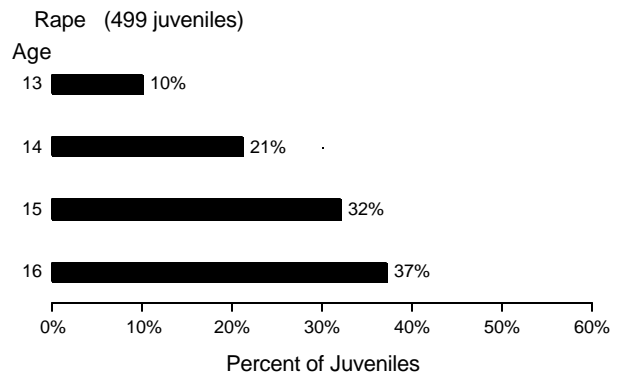
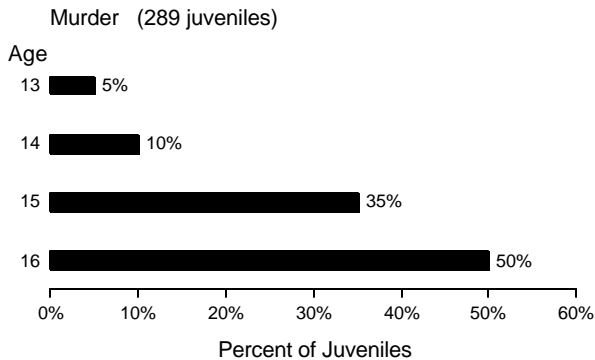
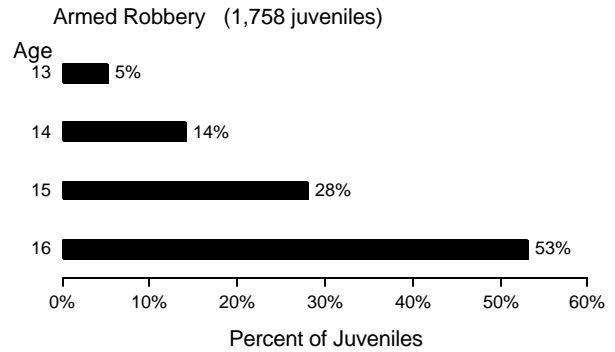
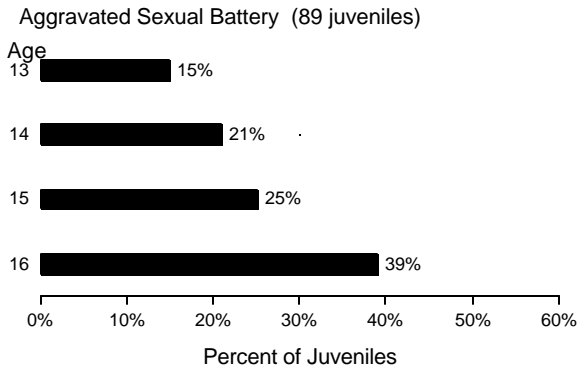
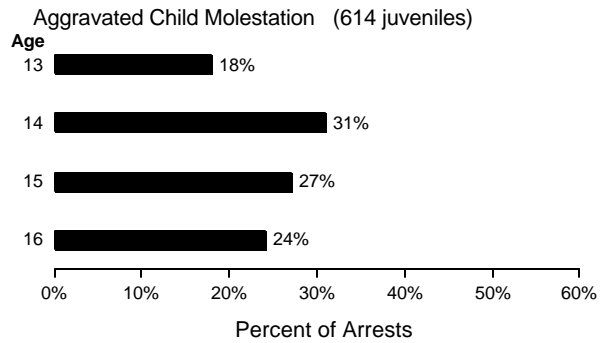
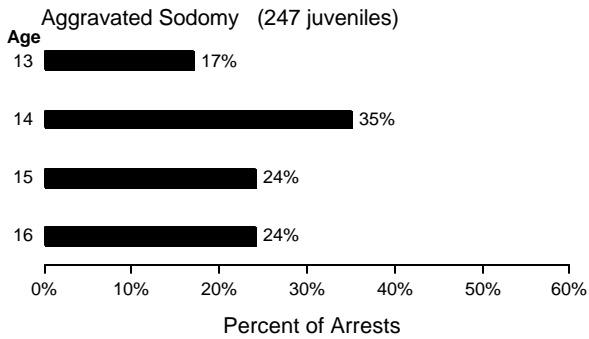
Age Profile, 1994 -2001 (3,285 juveniles)

Offense by Age



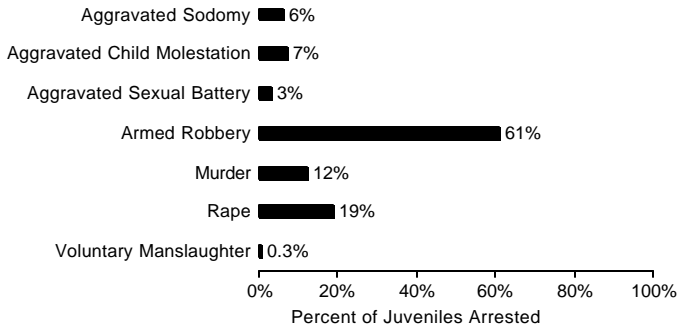

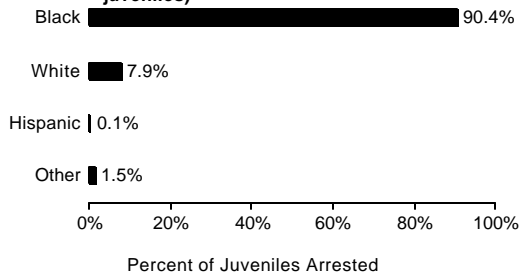

Georgia SB440 Offenses, 1994- 2001 (684 arrests)

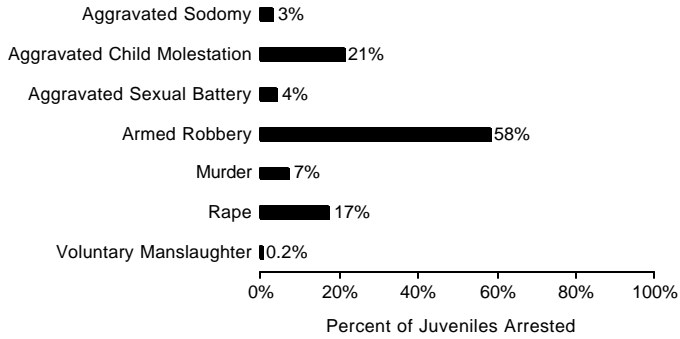


Race Profile, 1994-2001 (680 juveniles)

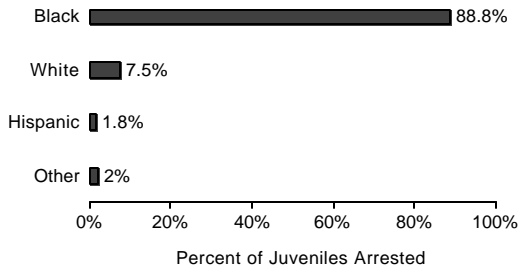

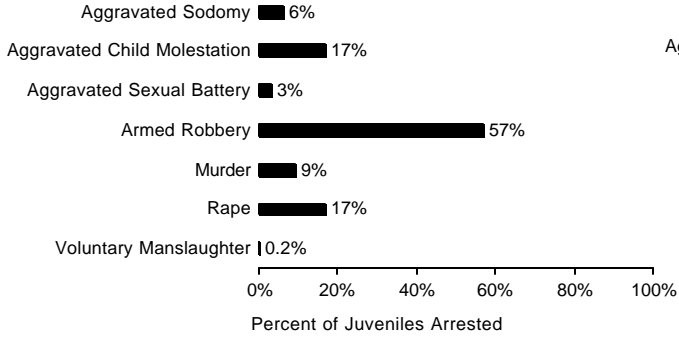
Metropolitan Atlanta - Statewide Summary: Arrests, 1994-2001

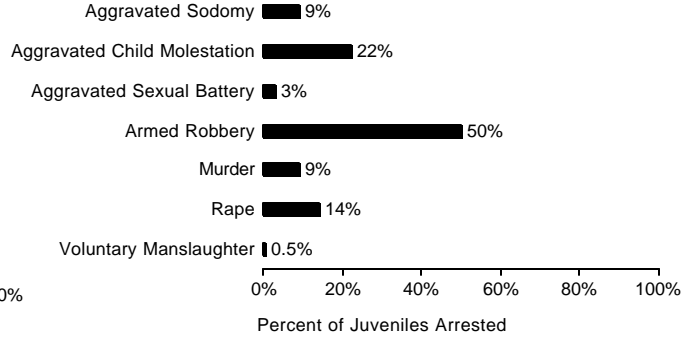

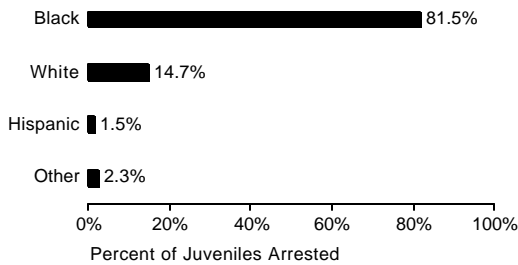
Georgia SB440 Offenses, 1994-2001 (1,642 juveniles)



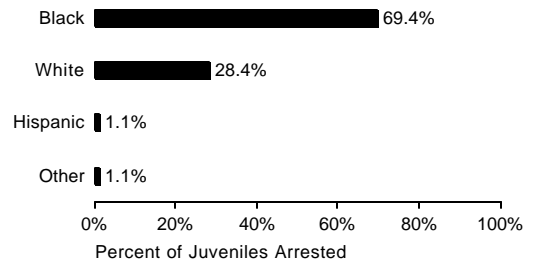
Georgia SB440 Offenses, 1994-2001 (1,971 juveniles)



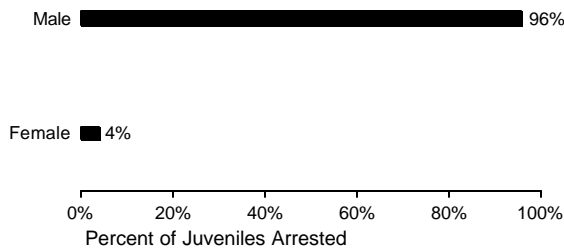

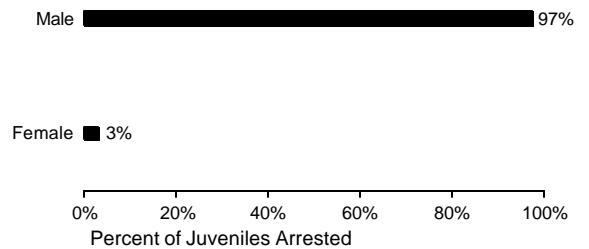
Race Profile, 1994-2001 (1,921 juveniles)

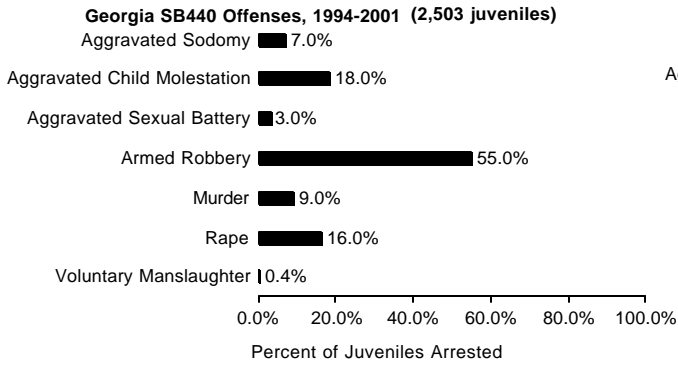

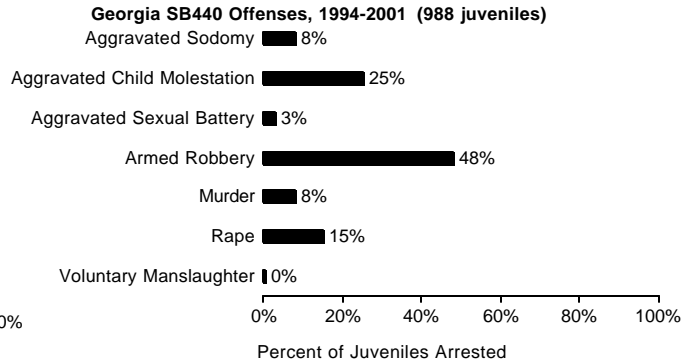
Urban-Rural Summary, 1994-2001

Urban-Rural Breakdown

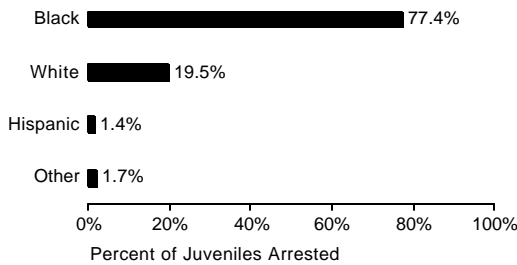

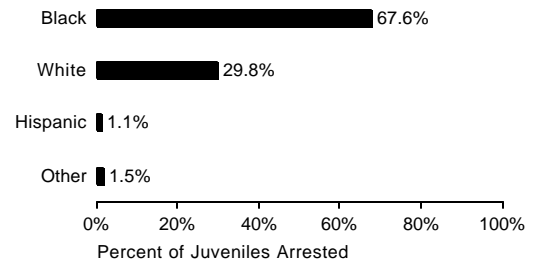
Rural Counties



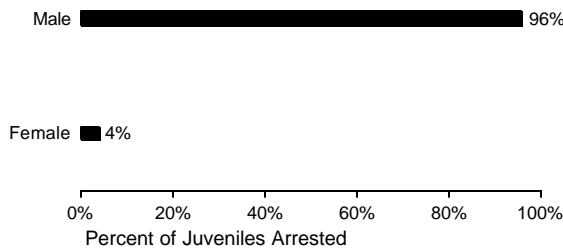

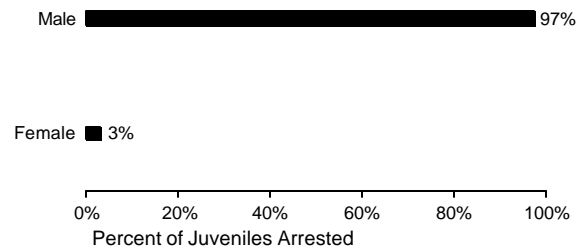
Race Profile, 1994-2001 (949 juveniles)
